

2009 PRENATAL CARE COORDINATION TWO-DAY CERTIFICATION TRAINING

For Medicaid and Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) Reimbursement

For Social Workers, Physicians, Registered Nurses, and Dietitians who work with at-risk pregnant women.

WHAT IS PRENATAL CARE COORDINATION (PCC)?

Care coordination is the process that integrates services according to individual needs. It is an active, ongoing process of assisting the individual to identify, access, and utilize community resources and coordinating services to meet individual needs. It is especially appropriate for individuals who need the services of many different providers or their risk status requires regular, comprehensive services by health care providers, as well as other community agencies and professionals. Levels of care coordination can be provided appropriate to individual needs and risk status. The process includes comprehensive assessment, development of an individualized service plan, linking individuals with services, monitoring services received, and measurement of individual progress and evaluation. It includes development of collaborative arrangements among service providers who are simultaneously serving the individual's needs, resulting in an integrated system of services. Care coordination assures that services are delivered in a supportive, acceptable, effective, and efficient manner to all Medicaid eligible pregnant women.

WHO MAY BE CERTIFIED TO BE CARE COORDINATORS IN INDIANA?

Physicians licensed in the state of Indiana

Registered nurses licensed in the state of Indiana

Dietitians registered with the American Dietetic Association

Social Workers licensed in the state of Indiana

or baccalaureate and masters level social workers from an accredited school of social work

WHAT ARE THE CERTIFICATION TRAINING OBJECTIVES?

- A. Definitions of care coordination and reimbursable services
- B. Communication; roles, processes and functions of care coordination
- C. Reassessment and follow-up services
- D. Assessing high-risk pregnancies
- E. Postpartum and newborn assessment services
- F. Building community partnerships and collaborative services
- G. Community outreach
- H. Field requirements for the Medicaid and MCOs billing processes (includes a separate billing manual)

The curriculum was developed by the Indiana Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers in consultation with model programs operating in urban and rural settings in Indiana. The Indiana State Department of Health and the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration, Office of Medicaid Policy and Planning have approved and collaborated in the development of the certification training process. The process of certifying care coordinators creates professional standards for the delivery of services and gives professional recognition to those who are certified.

HOW MUCH DOES THE TWO-DAY CERTIFICATION TRAINING COST?

The fee is \$195.00 which **includes PCC billing workshop, participant PCC training and billing manuals**, the new "Great Beginnings" baby book, morning/afternoon breaks for both days (plus lunch for the first day). At the end of the training, participants will receive documentation certifying their completion of the two-day PCC training.
